



Winchester Model 70

Introduced in 1936, the Model 70 was largely based on the Winchester Model 54 and the Mauser 98. It is still highly regarded by shooters and is often called

"The Rifleman's Rifle".

In 1999, Shooting Times magazine
named the Model 70 the

"Bolt-action Rifle of the Century"

Similar to the *Mauser 98*, the model 70 has a large non-rotating extractor, two massive forward locking lugs and a fixed ejector



Note that the ejector slot on the model 70 has been moved as to not weaken the left locking lug

The large non-rotating Claw extractor provides positive case extraction under any condition!



A Remington 700 extractor for comparison.

The model 70's safety is one of the best designs of any bolt action rifle today. It has remained unchanged since 1936.

Forward = Fire
Middle = Safe, Bolt opens and closes
Rearward = Safe, Bolt Locked

When in the Middle and Rear positions, the safety actually cams the striker rearward and blocks it from being able to go forward.





The rugged model 70 trigger is very simple, effective and is easy to adjust. It can be adjusted for weight and over travel. Sear engagement is already built into the design.

The Super Grade had upgraded wood, a raised cheek piece, inlaid swivels, a black fore end tip and engraved floor plate.





Marine sniper, Carlos Hathcock was a member of the USMC rifle team, and in 1965 he won the Wimbledon Cup, a 1000-yard match at Camp Perry. Hathcock won that prestigious trophy with a Winchester Model 70.



He also used a Model 70 to send a lot of VC back to hell.



The Model 70 has been used as the foundation for many custom gun builds



Many other manufactures have adopted the Model 70's key features for their rifles.





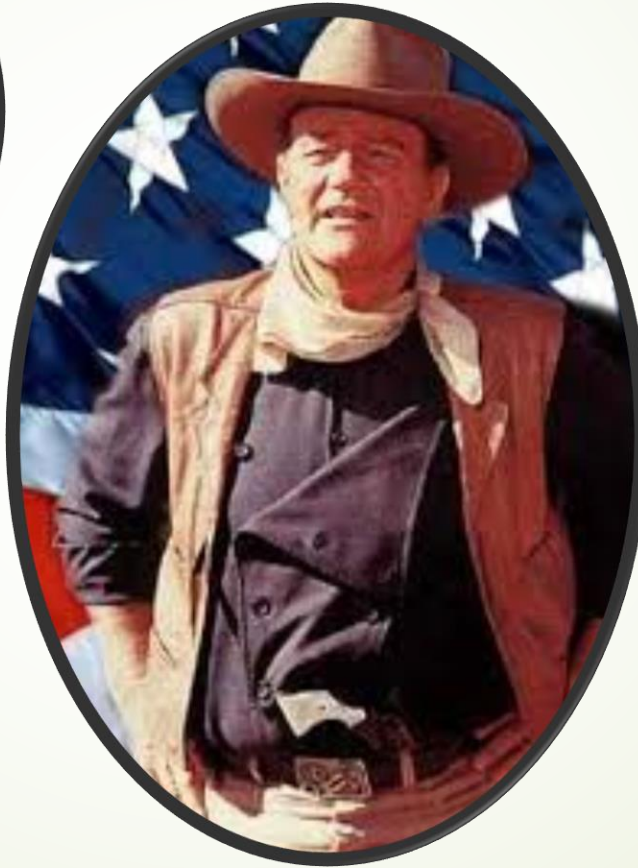

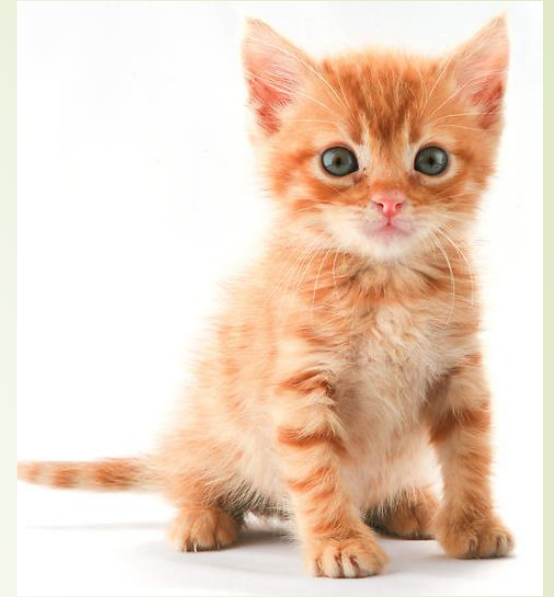
